### Dear Selectmen,

I am writing to provide further input on the public hearing of April 7, 2021 on Chapter 191-17, Parking on Kimball Street, which was continued to April 21st. I would like to remind everyone that the recommendations of the Police Department and Public Works Department for a no parking zone were opposed solely by residents of 12 to 14 Kimball. At the hearing on April 7th, the possibility of making Kimball Street a one way was discussed as an alternative which might allow parking on one side of the street. I am strongly in opposition to making Kimball Street a one way in either direction for the following reasons. If Kimball Street were made a one way going north, (from Glass Street to Main Street) it would create a plowing problem because the plows are unable to push large quantities of snow uphill and the plowing schedule, especially in heavy snow storms, does not allow for the Town's trucks to service Kimball before considerable snow accumulates. Trash pickup would also be more complicated in winter because sidewalks would be the only place to safely place trash and recycle carts and a sidewalk exists on only the west side of the street. If Kimball were made a one way going south, (Main Street to Glass Street) the snow accumulations would be deposited largely on the west or downhill side of the street and, in addition to depositing unmanageable amounts of snow on the sidewalks (which the Town is not always able to clear until days after a storm because of limited resources), it would create a snow removal hardship for residents on the west side of the street and leave no place for carts on trash day. The space limits between the street and homes on the west side of Kimball Street can clearly be seen from an examination of the Town's property tax maps of Kimball Street, which show how very little room exists for residents to place their snow. An attached copy of that tax map, supported by an overhead photo from Google Earth testify to the proximity of houses to the road on that side of the street. Please note that the potential for traffic congestion is not well document in the Google Earth photo. Since that photo was taken, another house was built at 16 Kimball Street, (the east side) and a special variance was granted, which in my opinion, was in violation of the Town code, for the line-ofsight requirement for the driveway for that property. Now, with that additional blind driveway, hidden below the crest of the hill, vehicles parked on either side of Kimball at the crest of the hill only exacerbate the danger of automobile accidents, especially for compact cars which ride lower to the ground and do not offer the visibility of taller sport utility vehicles and trucks.

On the subject of trucks, since the onset of the COVID pandemic, the number of deliveries from large delivery vehicles like UPS, Fed EX and Amazon Prime and a narrowed roadway due to parked cars only makes the situation more dangerous. I know that members of the Board of Selectmen indicated their desire to travel that street to see the situation for themselves and I applaud that sense of fairness, but I hope that they were able to visualize a full-sized pickup truck or similar vehicle being parked at the crest of the hill, sometimes accompanied by another vehicle on the opposite side without it being on the public sidewalk when they examined the area. Also image Tri-Town or a Fire Department vehicle needing to negotiate that narrow gap which would remain.

Whereas the prime concern about a no parking zone on the street comes from residents at 12-14 Kimball, I would also call you attention to the amount of back land shown on the tax map and Google Earth photo for that property, which could be used as parking for those residents.

In summary then, I remain staunchly opposed to making Kimball Street one way in either direction, I strongly support the original amendment to Chapter 191-17 to prohibit parking for a 450-foot distance

on either side to the crest of the hill as recommended by the Public Works and Police Departments, and I ask that you support their recommendation by voting in the amendment as originally submitted.

Request: I am asking that the Board of Selectman approve No parking in





# **Crosswalk Maintenance Responsibilities:**

Uncontrolled crosswalks on State-maintained highways are the maintenance responsibility of the municipality, except in school zones, where only the crosswalk nearest the front door of the school is maintained by the State. Maintenance refers to a program of pavement marking maintenance in conformance with the MUTCD. Access to crosswalks shall be maintained year round. Year round access is considered to refer to winter snow removal and treatment of ice at approaches to the crosswalk location.

Parking shall be restricted and enforced within 20 feet <u>minimum</u> from each end of the crosswalk in all directions by the municipality. "No Parking" signs shall be installed and maintained by the municipality as appropriate.

Pedestrian crossing warning signs at all uncontrolled crosswalks and established unmarked pedestrian crossings will be installed and maintained by the Department.

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

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

# Intermittent Water Withdrawals from Surface Waters

Intermittent water withdrawals from surface waters are allowed in New Hampshire without a permit under certain conditions. Examples of intermittent withdrawals include drawing water from rivers or lakes at convenient access points by bulk water transporters for the purpose of filling swimming pools, hydro-seeding, spraying for dust control and roadbed compaction at construction sites, and similar activities. Other examples include occasional withdrawals for irrigation and for dust control at gravel pits.



Temporary surface water withdrawals are subject to various conditions, including New Hampshire common law. Common law comes from long-established judicial practice and convention rather than from a particular law or statute. Such conditions include:

- 1. The withdrawal shall have the permission of the riparian landowner. A riparian landowner is the owner of the property with frontage on the river, stream, lake or pond from which the withdrawal is made. Please see the next page for more details.
- 2. The withdrawal shall not create adverse impacts to aquatic life, recreation or other public use of the waterbody. For example, a withdrawal must not result in significant lowering of stream flow or lake levels.
- 3. The withdrawal shall be "reasonable" with respect to the uses of others. For example, a withdrawal should not be so large that not enough water is left for irrigation by someone downstream.

Temporary surface water withdrawals are also subject to the below conditions pursuant to current state and federal regulations:

- 1. Water withdrawals from surface waters shall not be used for bulk transport of drinking water. Additional information about emergency bulk water for public drinking water is available from NHDES.
- 2. The withdrawal shall not involve a physical disturbance to the bed or banks of the surface water. If the withdrawal can be made by simply laying a pipe or hose over the bank into the water without

- causing erosion and if the pipe only remains in place on a temporary or seasonal basis, a wetlands permit is not needed.
- 3. The withdrawal shall not exceed 20,000 gallons per day averaged over a 7-day period or over 600,000 gallons in a 30-day period without determining if a water quality certificate is required and without registering and reporting water use.
- 4. The withdrawal shall not result in any discharges to the waterbody. Whether intentional or not, spillage, backflow, or erosion of the shoreline into the waterbody is considered a discharge and may result in a water quality violation or a wetlands violation. The tank should not contain residual liquids that could degrade water quality in the case of backflow or spillage.
- 5. Invasive plants shall not be introduced into the waterbody. Pipes and hoses should be carefully inspected to be certain that they are free of any traces of exotic weeds (e.g., Eurasian milfoil, fanwort, purple loosestrife, water chestnut, etc.).

### **Riparian Landowner Permission Details**

If one does not actually own the land abutting the site of the intended water withdrawal, then explicit permission of the riparian landowner is required before a withdrawal can occur. Essentially, in this case, the landowner is conveying his/her riparian water right to the person making the withdrawal, still subject to reasonable use.

Withdrawals made from state-owned property require written permission from the agency with primary responsibility for monitoring and/or maintaining the site. These agencies include:

New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (603) 271-3406 \*State owned dams and flood control areas.

New Hampshire Department of Transportation (603) 271-3734

\*State highway rights of way and bridges.

New Hampshire Department of Natural and Cultural Resources (603) 271-2411

\*State parks, beaches, natural areas, trails, historic sites, ski mountains.

New Hampshire Fish and Game Department (603) 271-1134

\*Withdrawals for commercial purposes from any public boat launch or fishing access point owned by New Hampshire Fish and Game are prohibited by administrative rule Fis 1603.01(y).

Care should also be exercised to avoid creating a safety hazard to motorists and other passersby and to not interfere with other accepted activities at the site of withdrawal.

# **Governor Chris Sununu Announces** Statewide Mask Mandate to Expire

**Concord, NH** – Today, Governor Chris Sununu announced that the statewide mask mandate implemented on November 20, 2020 will expire tomorrow, Friday, April 16.

The announcement follows a reduction in the state's 7-day average of daily deaths to 0.6, the lowest since October of 2020 before the mask mandate had been implemented, as hospitalizations remain at a manageable level, and as over 70% of those 65+ have been vaccinated.

"We have been very careful from the beginning of this pandemic to take items up individually and make informed decisions," said Governor Chris Sununu. "We have never set arbitrary dates unsupported by the data and the science. It is important to note that this mandate going away will not limit or prevent the ability of private businesses and local cities and towns from requiring masks. Of course, we continue to encourage folks to wear masks when they are unable to socially distanced."

"NH public health continues to work towards protecting the health of all NH residents and communities," said Dr. Benjamin Chan, State Epidemiologist. "Throughout the pandemic, we have advised people to wear face masks to protect themselves and prevent COVID-19 from spreading, even when there was no mask mandate. The lifting of the mandate does not diminish the importance of wearing a face mask. The threat to health from COVID-19 is real. Even as restrictions are reduced, we are still in a pandemic and levels of COVID-19 remain high across the State. Therefore, we ask that people continue to take steps to protect their own health, the health of their family and friends, and the health of their community."

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
